Description

The JW050R, JW075R, JW100R, and JW150R Power Modules are dc-dc converters that operate over an input voltage range of 36 Vdc to 75 Vdc and provide a precisely regulated dc output. The outputs are fully isolated from the inputs, allowing versatile polarity configurations and grounding connections. The modules have maximum power ratings from 50 W to 150 W at a typical full-load efficiency of 90%.

The sealed modules offer a metal baseplate for excellent thermal performance. Threaded-through holes are provided to allow easy mounting or addition of a heat sink for high-temperature applications. The standard feature set includes remote sensing, output trim, and remote on/off for convenient flexibility in distributed power applications.

Fusing Considerations

CAUTION: This power module is not internally fused. An input line fuse must always be used.

This encapsulated power module can be used in a wide variety of applications, ranging from simple stand-alone operation to an integrated part of a sophisticated power architecture. To preserve maximum flexibility, internal fusing is not included; however, to achieve maximum safety and system protection, always use an input line fuse. The safety agencies require a normal-blow, dc fuse with a maximum rating of 20 A (see Safety Considerations section). Based on the information provided in this data sheet on inrush energy and maximum dc input current, the same type of fuse with a lower rating can be used. Refer to the fuse manufacturer's data for further information.

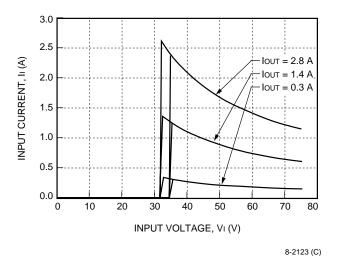

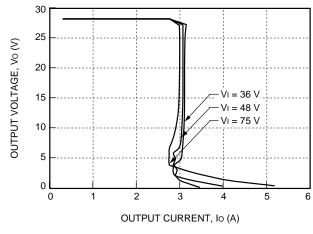


Figure 1. Typical JW075R Input Characteristics at Room Temperature, Io = Full Load

Figure 3. Typical JW075R Output Characteristics at Room Temperature

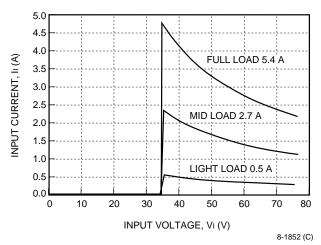


Figure 2. Typical JW150R Input Characteristics at Room Temperature

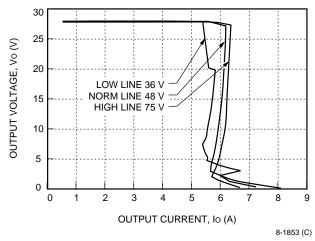


Figure 4. Typical JW150R Output Characteristics at Room Temperature

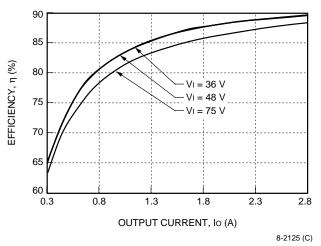


Figure 5. Typical JW075R Converter Efficiency vs.
Output Current at Room Temperature

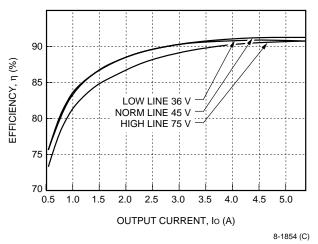


Figure 6. Typical JW150R Converter Efficiency vs.
Output Current at Room Temperature

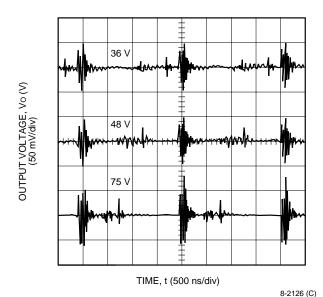


Figure 7. Typical JW075R Output Ripple Voltage at Room Temperature, 36 Vdc to 75 V Input, and 30 A Output

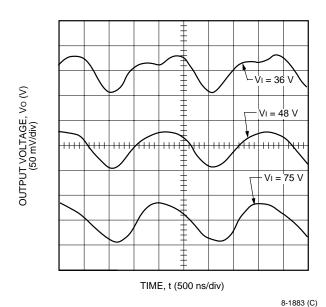


Figure 8. Typical JW150R Output Ripple Voltage at Room Temperature, 36 Vdc to 75 V Input, and 5.4 A Output

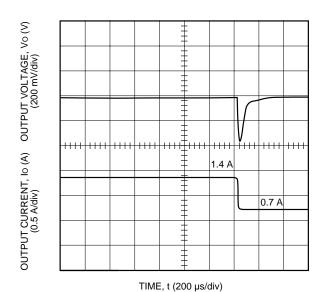


Figure 9. Typical JW075R Transient Response to Step Decrease in Load from 50% to 25%

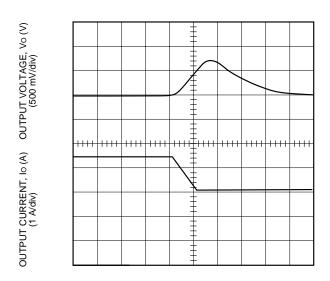


Figure 10. Typical JW150R Transient Response to Step Decrease in Load from 50% to 25% of Full Load at Room Temperature and 48 Vdc Input (Waveform Averaged to **Eliminate Ripple Component.)**

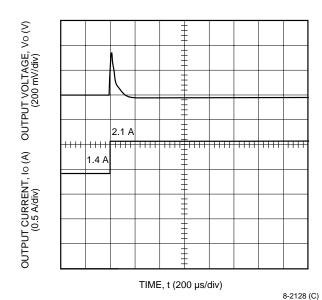
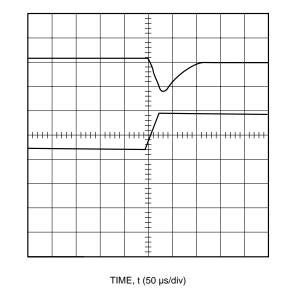


Figure 11. Typical JW075R Transient Response to Step Increase in Load from 50% to 75% of Full Load at Room Temperature and 48 Vdc Input (Waveform Averaged to **Eliminate Ripple Component.)**

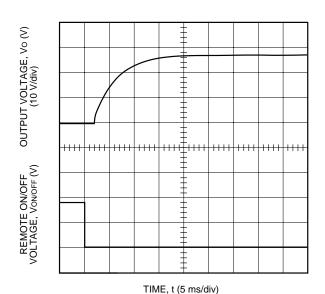


Figure 13. Typical Start-Up from Remote On/Off JW075R1; lo = Full Load

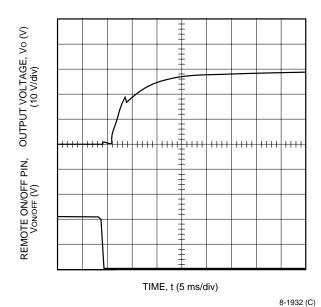
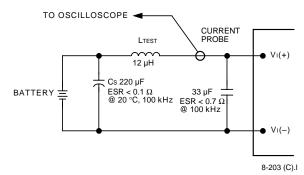


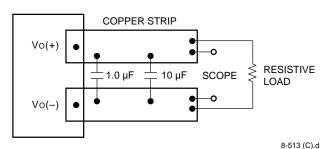
Figure 14. Typical Start-Up from Remote On/Off JW150R; lo = Full Load

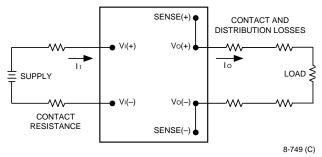
Figure 15. Input Reflected-Ripple Test Setup

Design Considerations

Input Source Impedance

The power module should be connected to a low ac-impedance input source. Highly inductive source impedances can affect the stability of the power module. For the test configuration in Figure 15, a 33 μF electrolytic capacitor (ESR < 0.7 Ω at 100 kHz) mounted close to the power module helps ensure stability of the unit. For other highly inductive source impedances, consult the factory for further application guidelines.

Safety Considerations

For safety-agency approval of the system in which the power module is used, the power module must be installed in compliance with the spacing and separation requirements of the end-use safety agency standard, i.e., *UL*-1950, *CSA* 22.2-950, and EN60950.

For the converter output to be considered meeting the requirements of safety extra-low voltage (SELV), one of the following must be true:

- All inputs are SELV and floating, with the output also floating.
- All inputs are SELV and grounded, with the output also grounded.

Any non-SELV input must be provided with reinforced insulation from any other hazardous voltages, including the ac mains, and must have an SELV reliability test performed on it in combination with the converters. Inputs must meet SELV requirements.

If the input meets extra-low voltage (ELV) requirements, then the converter's output is considered ELV.

The input to these units is to be provided with a maximum 20 A normal-blow fuse in the ungrounded lead.

Electrical Descriptions

Current Limit

To provide protection in a fault (output overload) condition, the unit is equipped with internal current-limiting circuitry and can endure current limiting for an unlimited duration. At the point of current-limit inception, the unit shifts from voltage control to current control. If the output voltage is pulled very low during a severe fault, the current-limit circuit can exhibit either foldback or tailout characteristics (output current decrease or increase). The unit operates normally once the output current is brought back into its specified range.

Feature Descriptions

Remote On/Off

Two remote on/off options are available. Positive logic remote on/off turns the module on during a logic high voltage on the ON/OFF pin, and off during a logic low. Negative logic remote on/off turns the module off during a logic high and on during a logic low. Negative logic (code suffix "1") is the factory-preferred configuration.

To turn the power module on and off, the user must supply a switch to control the voltage between the on/off terminal and the $V_1(-)$ terminal ($V_{on/off}$). The switch can be an open collector or equivalent (see Figure 18). A logic low is $V_{on/off} = 0$ V to 1.2 V. The maximum $I_{on/off}$ during a logic low is 1 mA. The switch should maintain a logic-low voltage while sinking 1 mA.

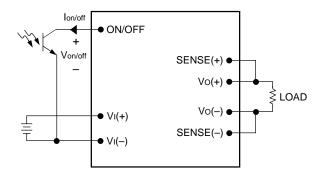
During a logic high, the maximum Von/off generated by the power module is 15 V. The maximum allowable leakage current of the switch at Von/off = 15 V is 50 µA.

Feature Descriptions (continued)

Remote On/Off (continued)

If not using the remote on/off feature, do one of the following:

- For negative logic, short ON/OFF pin to V_I(–).
- For positive logic, leave ON/OFF pin open.

Remote Sense

Remote sense minimizes the effects of distribution losses by regulating the voltage at the remote-sense connections. The voltage between the remote-sense pins and the output terminals must not exceed the output voltage sense range given in the Feature Specifications table, i.e.:

$$[Vo(+) - Vo(-)] - [SENSE(+) - SENSE(-)] \le 0.5 \text{ V}$$

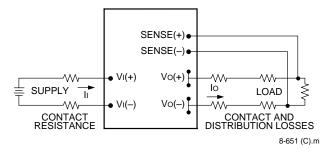


Figure 19. Effective Circuit Configuration for Single-Module Remote-Sense Operation

The voltage between the Vo(+) and Vo(-) terminals must not exceed the minimum output voltage clamp value as indicated in the Feature Specifications table. This limit includes any increase in voltage due to remote-sense compensation and output voltage setpoint adjustment (trim). See Figure 19.

If not using the remote-sense feature to regulate the output at the point of load, then connect SENSE(+) to Vo(+) and SENSE(-) to Vo(-) at the module.

Output Voltage Set-Point Adjustment (Trim)

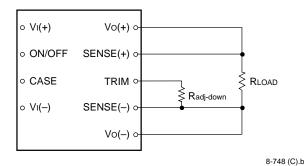


Figure 20. Circuit Configuration to Decrease Output Voltage

Output voltage trim allows the user to increase or decrease the output voltage set point of a module. This is accomplished by connecting an external resistor between the TRIM pin and either the SENSE(+) or SENSE(-) pins. With an external resistor between the TRIM and SENSE(-) pins ($R_{adj-down}$), the output voltage set point ($V_{O, adj}$) decreases (see Figure 20). The following equation determines the required external-resistor value to obtain a percentage output voltage change of Δ %.

$$\text{Radj-down } = \left(\frac{100}{\Delta\%} - 2\right) \ k\Omega$$

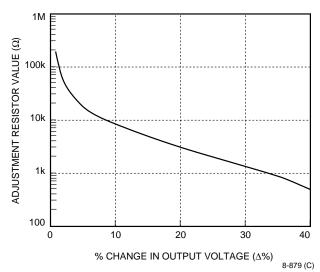


Figure 21. Resistor Selection for Decreased Output Voltage

The test results for this configuration are displayed in Figure 21. This figure applies to all output voltages.

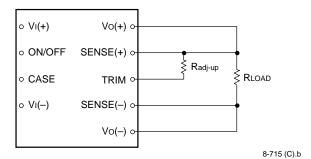


Figure 22. Circuit Configuration to Increase

With an external resistor connected between the TRIM and SENSE(+) pins (Radj-up), the output voltage set point (Vo, adj) increases (see Figure 22).

Note: The output voltage of this module may be increased to a maximum of 0.5 V. The 0.5 V is the combination of both the remote-sense and the output voltage set-point adjustment (trim). Do not exceed 28.5 V between the Vo(+) and Vo(-) terminals.

The following equation determines the required external-resistor value to obtain a percentage output voltage change of $\Delta\%$.

$$\mbox{Radj-up} \ = \left(\frac{\mbox{V}_{O}(100 + \Delta\%)}{1.225\Delta\%} - \frac{(100 + 2\Delta\%)}{\Delta\%} \right) \ \ \mbox{k} \Omega \label{eq:radj-up}$$

Only trim up to 0.5 V maximum. See note above.

Feature Descriptions (continued)

Output Voltage Set-Point Adjustment (Trim) (continued)

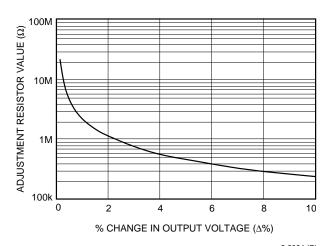


Figure 23. Resistor Selection for Increased Output Voltage

The test results for this configuration are displayed in Figure 23. For applications requiring voltages between 28 V and 52.5 V, consider using the JW200S52R51 trimmed down.

The voltage between the Vo(+) and Vo(-) terminals must not exceed the minimum output voltage clamp value as indicated in the Feature Specifications table.

This limit includes any increase in voltage due to remote-sense compensation and output voltage setpoint adjustment (trim). See Figure 19.

If not using the trim feature, leave the TRIM pin open.

Output Voltage

Output Overvoltage Clamp

The output overvoltage clamp consists of control circuitry, independent of the primary regulation loop, that monitors the voltage on the output terminals. The control loop of the clamp has a higher voltage set point than the primary loop (see Feature Specifications table). This provides a redundant voltage control that reduces the risk of output overvoltage.

Overtemperature Protection (Shutdown)

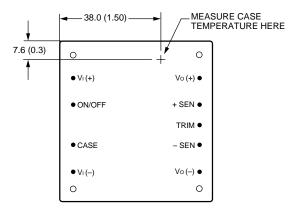
The 100 W and 150 W modules feature an overtemperature protection circuit to safeguard against thermal damage.

The circuit shuts down the module when the maximum case temperature is exceeded. The module restarts automatically after cooling.

Thermal Considerations

Introduction

The power modules operate in a variety of thermal environments; however, sufficient cooling should be provided to help ensure reliable operation of the unit. Heat-dissipating components inside the unit are thermally coupled to the case. Heat is removed by conduction, convection, and radiation to the surrounding environment. Proper cooling can be verified by measuring the case temperature. Peak temperature (Tc) occurs at the position indicated in Figure 24.

The temperature at this location should not exceed 100 °C. The output power of the module should not exceed the rated power for the module as listed in the Ordering Information table.

Although the maximum case temperature of the power modules is 100 °C, you can limit this temperature to a lower value for extremely high reliability.

For additional information on these modules, refer to the Lucent Technologies *Thermal Management JC-, JFC-, JW-, and JFW-Series 50 W to 150 W Board-Mounted Power Modules* Technical Note (TN97-008EPS).

Heat Transfer Without Heat Sinks

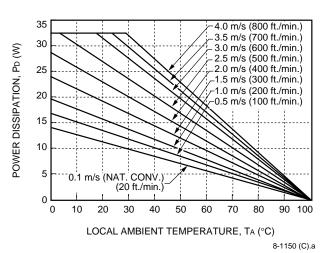


Figure 25. Forced Convection Power Derating with No Heat Sink; Either Orientation

Increasing airflow over the module enhances the heat transfer via convection. Figure 25 shows the maximum power that can be dissipated by the module without exceeding the maximum case temperature versus local ambient temperature (Ta) for natural convection through 4 m/s (800 ft./min.).

Note that the natural convection condition was measured at 0.05 m/s to 0.1 m/s (10 ft./min. to 20 ft./min.); however, systems in which these power modules may be used typically generate natural convection airflow rates of 0.3 m/s (60 ft./min.) due to other heat dissipating components in the system. The use of Figure 25 is shown in the following example.

Example

What is the minimum airflow necessary for a JW150R1 operating at nominal line, an output current of 5.3 A, and a maximum ambient temperature of 40 °C?

Solution

Given: $V_1 = 54 \text{ V}$ $I_0 = 5.3 \text{ A}$ $T_A = 40 \text{ °C}$

Determine PD (Use Figure 27.):

 $P_D = 14.8 W$

Determine airflow (v) (Use Figure 25.):

v = 1.5 m/s (300 ft./min.)

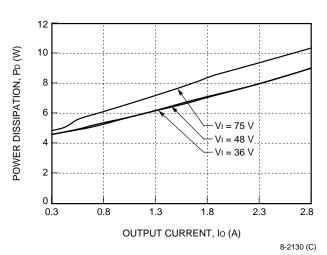


Figure 26. JW075R Power Dissipation vs. Output
Current

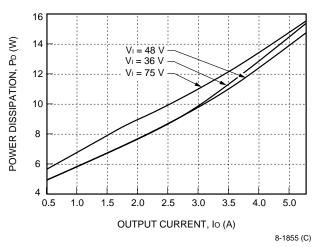


Figure 27. JW150R Power Dissipation vs.

Heat Transfer with Heat Sinks

The power modules have through-threaded, M3 x 0.5 mounting holes, which enable heat sinks or cold plates to attach to the module. The mounting torque must not exceed 0.56 N-m (5 in.-lb.). For a screw attachment from the pin side, the recommended hole size on the customer's PWB around the mounting holes is 0.130 ± 0.005 inches. If a larger hole is used, the mounting torque from the pin side must not exceed 0.25 N-m (2.2 in.-lb.).

Thermal derating with heat sinks is expressed by using the overall thermal resistance of the module. Total module thermal resistance (θ ca) is defined as the maximum case temperature rise (Δ Tc, $_{max}$) divided by the module power dissipation (PD):

$$\theta ca = \left[\frac{\Delta Tc, max}{P_D}\right] = \left[\frac{(Tc - TA)}{P_D}\right]$$

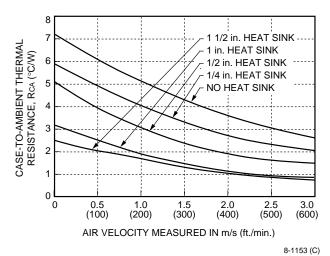


Figure 28. Case-to-Ambient Thermal Resistance Curves; Either Orientation

The location to measure case temperature (Tc) is shown in Figure 24. Case-to-ambient thermal resistance vs. airflow is shown, for various heat sink configurations and heights, in Figure 28. These curves were obtained by experimental testing of heat sinks, which are offered in the product catalog.

These measured resistances are from heat transfer from the sides and bottom of the module as well as the top side with the attached heat sink; therefore, the case-to-ambient thermal resistances shown are generally lower than the resistance of the heat sink by itself. The module used to collect the data in Figure 28 had a thermal-conductive dry pad between the case and the heat sink to minimize contact resistance. The use of Figure 28 is shown in the following example.

Thermal Considerations (continued)

Heat Transfer with Heat Sinks (continued)

Example

If an 85 °C case temperature is desired, what is the minimum airflow necessary? Assume the JW150R1 module is operating at nominal line and an output current of 5.3 A, maximum ambient air temperature of 40 °C, and the heat sink is 0.5 in.

Solution

Given: $V_1 = 54 \text{ V}$ $I_0 = 5.3 \text{ A}$ $T_A = 40 \text{ °C}$ $T_C = 85 \text{ °C}$ Heat sink = 0.5 in.

Determine Pp by using Figure 27:

$$P_D = 14.8 W$$

Then solve the following equation:

$$\theta ca = \left[\frac{(Tc - T_A)}{P_D}\right]$$

$$\theta ca = \left[\frac{(85-40)}{14.8} \right]$$

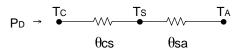

ca = 3.0 °C/W

Use Figure 28 to determine air velocity for the 0.5 inch heat sink.

The minimum airflow necessary for the JW150R1 module is 1.05 m/s (210 ft./min.).

Custom Heat Sinks

A more detailed model can be used to determine the required thermal resistance of a heat sink to provide necessary cooling. The total module resistance can be separated into a resistance from case-to-sink (θ cs) and sink-to-ambient (θ sa) shown below (Figure 29).

For a managed interface using thermal grease or foils, a value of θ cs = 0.1 °C/W to 0.3 °C/W is typical. The solution for heat sink resistance is:

$$\theta$$
sa = $\left[\frac{(Tc - TA)}{PD}\right] - \theta cs$

This equation assumes that all dissipated power must be shed by the heat sink. Depending on the userdefined application environment, a more accurate model, including heat transfer from the sides and bottom of the module, can be used. This equation provides a conservative estimate for such instances.

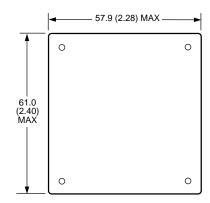

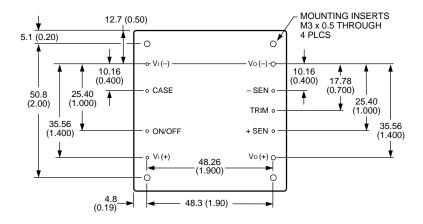

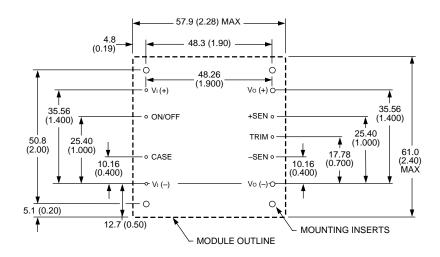
